ARNSHEEN PARK

It was with great excitement that Arnsheen Activity Park was officially opened on Saturday 18th July – a joint celebration with Barrhill's annual Gala Day. As you can see from the following photographs (with thanks to Linda Wild) a great time was had by all.



The refurbished Arnsheen Park features a 20m by 10m multi-use games arena which is big enough to play five-a-side football, an adventure trail, a double zip line which children and adults can race down and a playground which is the centrepiece of the refurbishment and the only one of its kind in Scotland.

Not only can all members of the public enjoy this marvellous facility – it benefits the school too.





Pupils and staff at Barrhill Primary can now enjoy an outdoor classroom area along with a stage, seating and sheltered area. There is an outdoor BBQ and picnic area for people to enjoy whilst there is also a specialised toddler play zone featuring a slide and many other pieces of equipment.

A clear winner was chosen with exciting plans set to be developed by the UK's leading playpark developers Hags SMP in conjunction with the BCIC. The winning design chosen by villagers was for a park clearly designed with children in mind!.

When we arrived, we firstly took all our things into the dining area in front of the Smuggler's Warren. Then, we all went down through the play area and up to the large (and bouncy) Go Boing. We all had a lot of fun bouncing around and knocking over parents and teachers. As we jumped and leapt around, the sky decided we were having too much fun and started to spit on us. GARDEN MAINTENANCE



As part of BCIC helping the community, a grass cutting service is available from April to October for free. The grass must be of lawn standard to start and then a local contractor employed by the BCIC will cut your grass approximately every 2 weeks. Defibrillator (PAD) for Barrhill

Those residents who read the Community Council minutes will be aware that back in November the Secretary applied for a Public Access Defibrillator (PAD) through the Scottish Government and Scottish Ambulance Service initiative, for location at the Barrhill Surgery, to be publicly accessible for 24 hours a day/7 days a week. An outdoor cabinet was also applied for.

Due to the overwhelming response from across Scotland to the initiative it was not until April that the decision was notified that the Community Council had been successful in its application for a PAD, but unfortunately unsuccessful in its application for a cabinet. The PAD itself has only just been received and now that the required size is known, an outdoor cabinet has been ordered and delivery is imminent. Barrhill Community Council is most grateful to the Scottish Ambulance Service for supplying the PAD, which is a vital piece of equipment, particularly in a rural area like Barrhill, where it is doubtful an ambulance would be likely to arrive quickly enough to resuscitate most victims of sudden cardiac arrest, the village being 13 miles from the nearest ambulance station. An automated external defibrillator (AED) can be deployed in the community to help resuscitate a victim of sudden cardiac arrest.



Should this occur, an ambulance should be summoned immediately, basic cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) performed and the AED used to provide a high energy electric shock to restore the heart's normal rhythm. When an AED is placed where it can be used by lay persons it is referred to as public access defibrillation (PAD).

The PAD can safely be used without training, being designed to be used by lay persons, as the machine guides the operator through the process by verbal instructions and visual prompts. It is, however, important to have sufficient people in the

community, trained to deliver CPR and to use a PAD. It is planned to hold a 'Heartstart' class in Barrhill very shortly and should any resident be interested in becoming a First Responder, the Community Council would be pleased to hear from him/her.

The Ballantrae Medical Practice has fully co-operated with the project, which is much appreciated, and it is anticipated that the PAD will be installed on the external wall of the Barrhill Surgery before too long. Until the installation has been carried out, the PAD is being stored temporarily at the Old Sweet Shop, 15 Main Street, Barrhill. (Contact: James Duffie, Tel. 07768 767083.) Once installation is complete full details will be made available to the community. COMMUNITY BUS TRIPS

The Community Bus trips are free for ALL residents of Barrhill and the surrounding area and now also for non-residents, the £1 nominal charge having been waived. The trips have, however, been reduced from monthly to bi-monthly, due to a fall in demand. So far this year there have only been two: in February to Castle Douglas, which is always a very popular trip, and in April to Dumfries. This trip was also well attended.



The trip scheduled for June, to Stranraer and Soleburn Garden Centre, unfortunately had to be cancelled, due to insufficient numbers. The BCIC have set a minimum number of passengers at six, in order for a trip to go ahead. On this occasion, which was not the first, only four passengers put their names forward. Cancellation of the trip incurred a cancellation fee of £15 from SAYLSA.



Further trips will be arranged and the BCIC would welcome suggestions of locations for these and also which day of the week is preferred. It is difficult to know the best day to suit the majority, with a complaint once being received from a resident that 'outings were only offered to a chosen few'! This was most definitely not the case with ALL age groups welcome, but in spite of the days of trips being varied in recent years (Saturdays or Sundays being chosen latterly), with a very few exceptions it is always the same residents who participate in the trips.

It is hoped to arrange a further trip in late August and the BCIC would ask that all residents who are interested in coming on a trip ensure they keep an eye on the notice board, situated adjacent to the shop window. Posters advertising the trips are placed there at least a fortnight in advance. It transpires that not all residents look at the items on the notice board!
